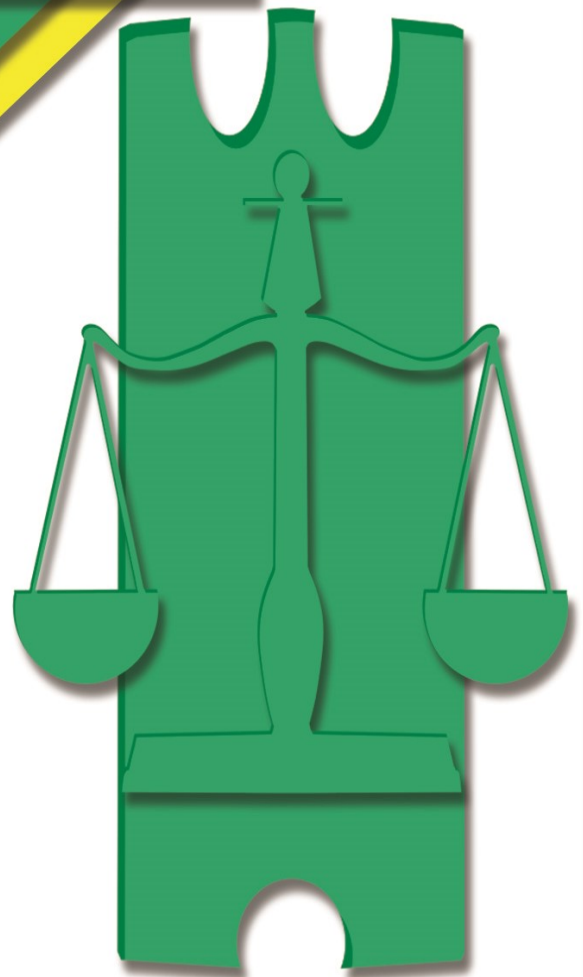

I. CONTEXT OF EXTENSION

Public safety is the function of governments which ensures the protection of citizens, persons in their territory, organizations, and institutions against threats to their well-being – and to the prosperity of their communities. Peace and order is an essential ingredient in maintaining economic development, social order and political stability. A condition of peace and order facilitates the growth of investments, generates more employment opportunities and attracts more tourists.

Public Safety is a paramount concern of the state. It is anchored on the time-honored principles of democracy. Without public safety, no progress will ever take place in any society. Indeed, public safety is a requirement of a just and civil society (Usana, 2001). Peace and order in any areas of the Philippines has been defined as inconsistent and restless. The absence or lack of peace and order in the community will directly affect the government's action towards progressive and well developed economy. Peace and order must start in the small unit of society which is family. Every family member of the family must be aware about crimes and its bad effects. With enough knowledge about this matter, no doubt everyone is prepared and can work independently without living in fear.

Extension is one of the four fold functions of a State College or Universities. In order for the College to perform such function, every faculty member must take part in this endeavor. Since the offering of the Criminology program in 1999, the Department of Criminology faculty members actively conduct research and development in their field of expertise that is on public safety and security. Most of the researches the MPSPC Criminology Department Extension Programs is anchored on the institution's program (IHERITAGE) as the major thrust of the current administration. This is one of the avenues of attaining the vision of the College re: Mountain Province State Polytechnic College envisions to become a vibrant and dynamic educational center.

The Advocacy extension program is also anchored on Republic Act No. 6506, Otherwise Known as "An Act Creating the Board of Examiners for Criminologists in the Philippines". The law provides that the State recognizes the importance of the Criminology profession in national security, public safety, peace and order, and in nation-building and development.

Responsive to its mandate, due to commission of crimes within the province, the faculty members of the Criminology Department are urged to design programs on awareness on the effect of crimes to the society, how it affects life and economy among community members from the different municipalities in Mountain Province. It includes but not limited to awareness on drug abuse, juvenile delinquency prevention, fire prevention and the Philippine Criminal Justice System as these may help in the crime prevention and in maintaining peace and order in the community. Likewise, the Criminology Department also offers extension activities related to climate change and disaster risk reduction management.

The Criminology extension program is more on advocacy which is geared towards educating and guiding members of the society. The Significant role of education in the assurance of public safety cannot be taken for granted. Education shapes civilization over time. According to Barlett Giamatti "*Education is the heart of a civil society, and the heart of education is the act of teaching*". Education is the surest way to safety. The public must, in every sphere of their lives, receive the kind of education they are in need of to equip themselves with the surefire formula of establishing a peaceful and orderly society. Without proper education and guidance from teachers of every discipline, the safety of the public can only be called a rough

sketch. And if public safety is drawn in rough, the nation's development may similarly be drawn in haste, which is waste in the process (Usana, 2001).

The extension program of the department is not limited on the promotion of peace and order and public safety but it also reviews student researches and extend recommendations like the need of physical fitness and moral recovery among inmates at the Mountain Province District Jail as part of their welfare and development programs, and the likes. Moreover, the department also extends to different agencies requesting the expertise of faculty members.

II. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Support the development of Mountain Province through the call of its extension services along peace and order and public security advocacy and other pertinent services which eventually generate an active and productive citizenry, in a safe and peaceful community.

B. Extension framework

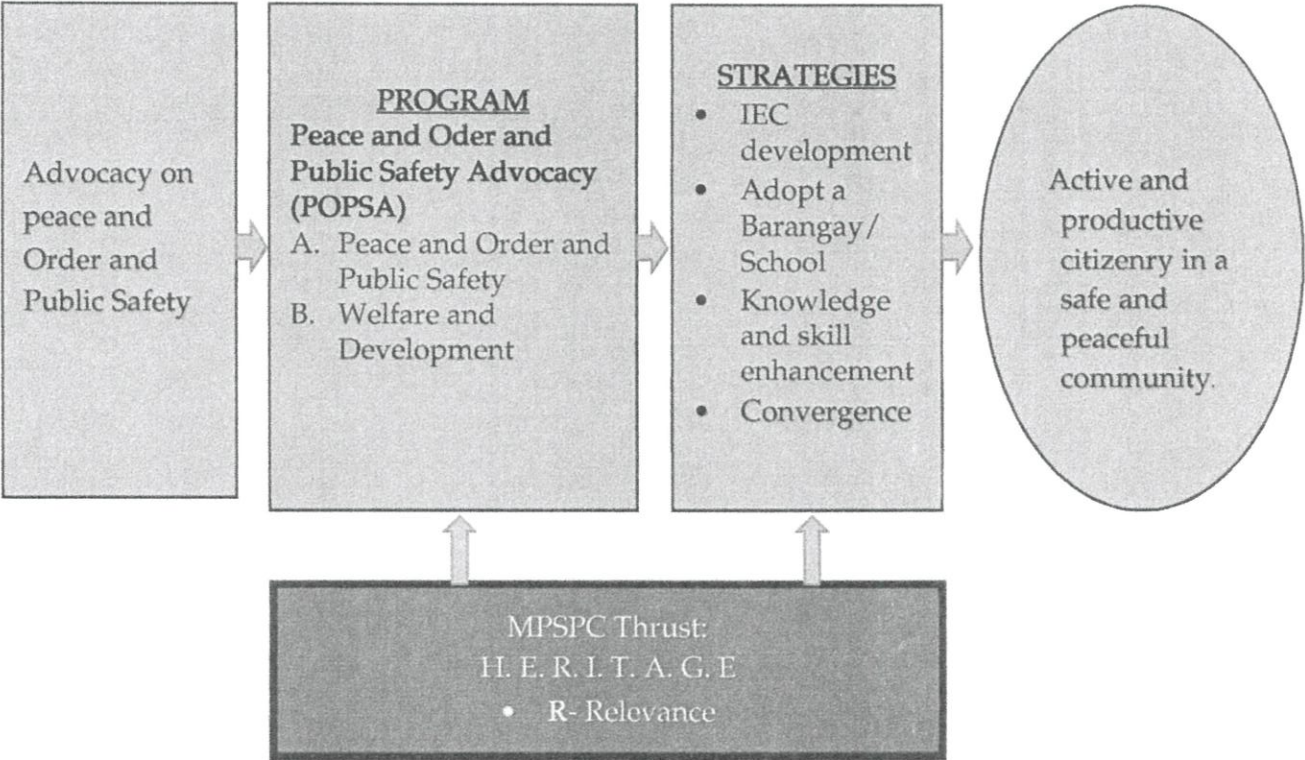


Figure 1. Criminology department extension framework

The Criminology Department Extension Program shall employ the following strategies: Develop, package, and promote access to public safety and knowledge products, adopt a barangay/school, knowledge and skill enhancement, consultancy and convergence with faculty members from other departments in coming up with extension program or activity.

If this Criminology extension program and activities will be conducted, the Criminology of MPSPC- Bontoc believes that there will be an active and productive citizenry, living in a safe peaceful community. IV. IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

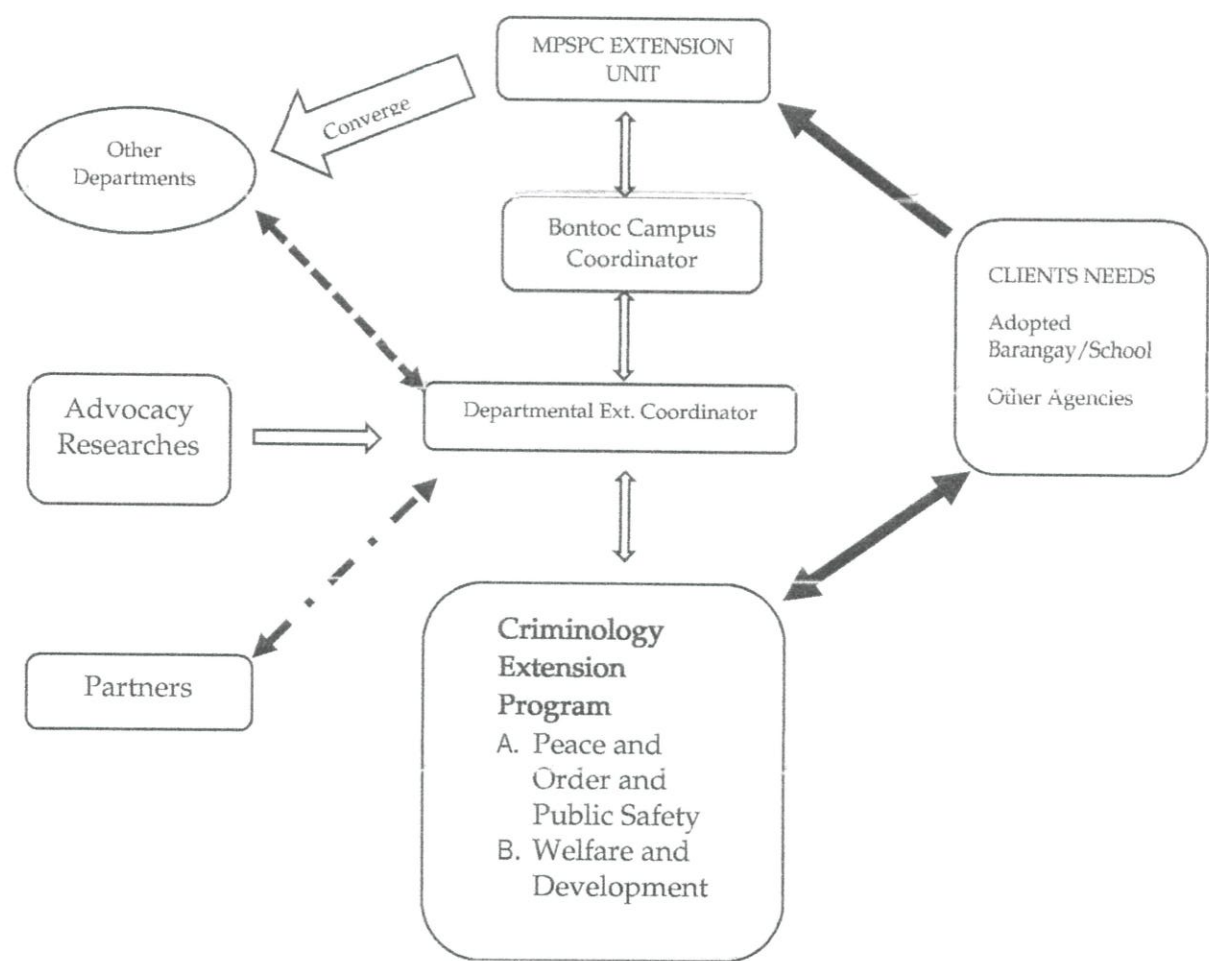


Figure 2. Criminology extension program implementation process on Peace and Order and Public Safety Advocacy (POPSA).

The implementation process of Criminology extension program Initiates when a client asks or request for assistance to the departmental coordinator or at the RDE unit. The request will be assessed if it fall among the program component of the department. The Dept. Coordinator or the concerned faculty of the criminology department prepares an activity design based on the request, then channel the request and prepared activity design to the campus coordinator for perusal, comments, and suggestions, then forwarded to the RDE unit for further review. If there be comments suggestions it will be returned to the Departmental Extension coordinator or concerned faculty for input and finalization of the activity. If the activity design is ready, then it follows the same process, until it will reach the office of the president for approval and finally for its implementation.

For activities needing the help of other departments, a convergence activity will be done, such convergence will be the responsibility of the RDE unit to determine.

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
