1. A month September

The name September comes from the old Roman word 'septem', which means seven, because in the Roman calendar it was the seventh month. The Anglo-Saxons called it Gerst monath (Barley month), because it was their time when they harvested barley to be made into their favourite drink - barley brew to be used to many occasions in the succeeding months specially the 10th month December.

September is a month where most mass killing of innocent persons happened and a month where most assassination of some dignitaries accomplished.

Believing that all of these evil activities will be outcome the government named September as a crime prevention month to alert us and fight every lawless activity done by either individual or terrorism. And in biblical September reminds us that it was this month when Michael, the Arch Angel went down from heaven to throw Lucifer (the devil) of his treacherous activities.

1. What is crime prevention?

CRIME(dakes) wrong doing – an act against the law or any violation of the law

PREVENT – To stop or keep from happening “pro-active”

CRIME PREVENTION – Stopping a crime or keeping it from happening

Crime prevention is the attempt to reduce and deter crime and criminals. It is applied specifically to efforts made by governments to reduce crime, enforce the law, and maintain criminal justice.

- The reduction or elimination of the desire and/or opportunity to commit crime.

“ AN OUNCE OF PRE VENTION IS WORTH A POUND OF CURE”

- “Police community partnership is more powerful than a barrel of gun”.

HOW DO WE PREVENT CRIME? to answer this question, let us first consider the elements of crime

1. **MOTIVE** – this is the underlying reason why a person or criminal commits a crime.

2. **OPPORTUNITY** – this is the “timing” or the precise moment when the crime is to be carried out. Actually, the most opportune time for a criminal to execute his unlawful desire is “almost anytime” can happen anytime within 24 hours of the day
3. **INSTRUMENTALITY** (skill)– This is the actual commission of the crime. This may well be considered the crime itself since the criminal intent has been executed or has begun in this stage “or the things/methods used in the commission of the crime”

MOTIVE + OPPURTUNITY = CRIME

“CRIME PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY’S BUSINESS

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

A. PERSONAL SECURITY

1. Avoid being a victim – crime conscious
2. Never walk alone at night (in cities)
3. Never accept ride, drink or gift from the strangers (you don’t know them)
4. Let parents know if you stay late after school
5. Ask permission to your parents if you want to play with other children
6. Avoid going home late at night
7. Never let anyone into your home without asking your permission.
8. Don’t tempt to get drunk
9. Make a habit to turn off the burner before leaving the house
10. Never play in or outside vehicle
11. Never play poisonous bottles.

B. BAD ACTIVITIES TO BE AVOIDED

1. Don’t make joke of pushing younger one to swim.
2. Do not play gun and aim gun to someone
3. Threat the gun always fully loaded
4. Never set a fire in the mountain
5. Don’t play lighters or matches

6. Never take anything that don't belongs to you
7. Never utter disgracing words to anyone

C. RULES FOR GETTING ON AND OFF THE BUS OR JEEP

1. When waiting for the bus or jeep stay away from the road.
2. Wait until the bus/jeep stopped before getting in or stepping onto the road.
3. If you are crossing the street see to it that there is no approaching vehicle.
4. stop if the traffic light is red and go if the traffic light is green

D. AS A STUDENTS

1. Join the Student Crime Prevention Committee
2. Engage in education and Information campaign
3. Dialogue with local police
4. Dialogue with school authorities
5. Select invitations
6. Avoid crime prone areas
7. Secure your belongings
8. Report situations that breed crime

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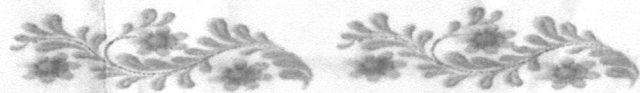
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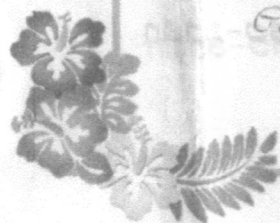
